ATTACHMENT A:

JUSTIFICATION FOR USE OF PROJECT LABOR AGREEMENT ON FAP 785 (IL 140), CONTRACT NUMBER 76G58, MADISON COUNTY, WHICH IS LOCATED ON IL 140 FROM APPROXIMATELY 0.2 MILE WEST OF IL 159 TO 0.1 MILE WEST OF PARK AVENUE IN HAMEL.

ITEM 2: This project is 80% federally funded.

ITEM 3: Estimated project cost is \$2,000,000. The project length is approximately 6.64 miles with ADT of 8,050. The project has a completion date of November 21, 2014.

The overall project scope consists of:

- Pavement patching throughout the project limits.
- Milling 1-1/2" to 2-1/4" off the existing 7" to 7-3/4" bituminous overlay of the concrete pavement and resurfacing with 2-1/4" to 2-1/2" hot-mix asphalt.
- Existing bituminous shoulders will be resurfaced with 2-1/4" to 2-1/2" hot-mix asphalt.
- Replacing a deteriorated 5'x5' box culvert.
- With a challenging completion date, stage construction along with daily lane closures will be utilized to complete the work.

Any disruption in the continuity of this project due to labor issues would result in delays in construction and completion date. As a result, incomplete portions of the project remaining closed to the traveling public and extended completion date may cause additional traffic delays due to delays by a work stoppage.

It is anticipated that lapsing trade agreements through any of the stages of work on this project would be addressed through the use of a Project Labor Agreement. It is the Illinois Department of Transportation's finding that the large skilled workforce needed for this project can be provided by the union trades involved and is a necessary requirement for a Project Labor Agreement.

ITEM 4: Since this is a June letting and there are 60 working days, the project will not get done in one construction season. Due to the temperature restrictions for the application of pavement marking, the contractor will have to wait until the spring to finish this work

ITEM 5: The Contractor has until November 21, 2014 to complete all items in the contract, except for the items related to pavement marking, raised reflective pavement marker installation and miscellaneous items necessary to complete the work. The Department will receive a better quality product if the box culvert replacement and resurfacing are completed. Failure to meet the completion date may result in partial completion of the box culvert replacement and resurfacing over the winter months. A labor agreement ensures that no stoppages in work will occur which would jeopardize the project schedule.

ITEM 6: This project has a completion date of November 21, 2014
